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WHAT COMPETENCE DOES SOUTH AFRICA PUT ITS STAKE ON IN THE HORIZON OF 2035?


In short:

A country that is competitive in 2035 will be one that is actively participating in the global village, producing and maintaining an attitude of skilfulness within the workforce


